Ce colloque explore l'évolution des connaissances encyclopédiques en Asie de l'Est entre le XVIII^e et le XIX^e siècle, une période marquée par des transformations sociales, culturelles et politiques profondes. En réunissant des experts de divers domaines, l'objectif est de mieux comprendre les motivations derrière la production de ces connaissances, les formes qu'elles ont prises, et leurs impacts durables sur les sociétés asiatiques et au-delà.

Les recherches s'articuleront autour de trois axes principaux : les motivations et formes de la production encyclopédique, la transmission et réception des connaissances encyclopédiques, et les impacts et héritages de cette production sur le développement de la science moderne, de la technologie, de la littérature, des identités culturelles et des récits nationaux.

Les participants, comprenant des professeurs, des chercheurs et des experts de renommée internationale, aborderont des sujets variés, tels que l'importance socio-culturelle des encyclopédies féminines en Corée, l'expansion des connaissances sous le règne de divers rois, et l'impact des échanges intellectuels entre l'Est et l'Ouest.

En explorant ces thèmes, le colloque vise à enrichir notre compréhension des dynamiques historiques et culturelles de cette région et à mettre en lumière la manière dont ces dynamiques ont façonné et continuent de façonner le paysage global des connaissances.
